Although promoted back in our February newsletter, here are the details once again on this amazing video show that features an instrument regarded as the world's largest Wurlitzer pipe organ. The show features two of the USA's top entertainers – **Jelani Eddington** and **Zach Frame.**

This presentation comes from the magnificent residence of the late Jasper Sanfilippo. Jasper, born in 1931, made his fortune working in his father's nut business, John B. Sanfilippo & Son, Inc. In 1963 upon his father's death, when the company's annual sales were just \$383,000, he assumed day to day control. Over the subsequent decades, Sanfilippo built the business into first a regional, and then national major nut supplier, and in 1991, Sanfilippo led the company in becoming listed on the Nasdaq, with then annual revenues of \$151 million. In 1995 the Sanfilippo business acquired the Fisher nut brand from Procter & Gamble, which later became the best-selling recipe nut brand in the United States.

Jasper had a great love of mechanical musical instruments and created a music room to house a stunning collection of restored instruments. Housing the collection, the Sanfilippo "Place de La Musique", recreates the Victorian era of the first movie palaces, with architectural details. The Music Theatre can seat 350 and houses the largest theatre pipe organ ever built. The overall experience is an auditory and visual immersion in one of the most exciting eras.

The nucleus of the theatre organ, (Wurlitzer opus #1571, built in 1927 for the Riviera Theatre in Omaha) has been expanded to 80 ranks of pipes – that's around 5000 pipes!! The overall result is the most versatile orchestral theatre pipe organ ever built. Behind the scrim are five chambers containing pipes, percussions, wind regulators and controls in a four-story-tall area. The console is patterned after the original from Chicago's Paradise Theatre; it is mounted on the original organ console lift from the Granada Theatre. Mounted on the wall to the left are the 32' Diaphone pipes, and to the right are the 32' Bombarde pipes. A 32-note set of Deagan Tower Bells, the largest of which weighs 426 lb., hang on each side of the room. To the rear of the room, the 'Ethereal' pipe chamber in the attic echoes softly from the skylight area, while the brass 'Trumpet Imperial' and copper 'Bugle Battaglia' speak with great authority from the back wall.

Every year, Jasper Sanfilippo presented a concert series, with all the proceeds assisting charities serving children, families, arts and culture through the Sanfilippo Foundation. Since his passing in 2020, his family continue this legacy.

At the console for our video-visit to the Sanfilippo "Place de La Musique", will be **Jelani Eddington**, well known to you all from his regular visits to play for us back in our Hollywood Cinema days.





Sharing the program is a new face for you (pictured left) – **Zach Frame**. Zach is the artist in residence at the Wurlitzer organ of the Organ Piper Pizza Restaurant, in Wisconsin.

We look forward to sharing this video-concert with you **and....** sharing a cuppa afterwards.

NEWS FROM THE ORGAN CHAMBERS!

Neil Warrington and his team have been attending to a number of small "behind-the-scenes" tasks, in preparation for a visit from our Australian organ building team.

As noted in the editorial, the Arnolds were in a real quandary, having two projects each requiring action sooner, not later. So, the Wurlitzer Organ Trust of Auckland reached a very amicable separation from our agreement with Julien and Mark to enable them to commit needed time to the Dendy job. But....as one door closes another one opens and thanks to "matchmaker" John Fuhrmann in Perth, he brought us together with *Richard Larritt* and *Peter Hosking* from Adelaide, who have offered help to see our beleaguered organ install project finally fulfilled.

Both men have a long association with the Capri Theatre in Adelaide, where they continue to keep this massive Wurlitzer organ living up to the word "MIGHTY".



For a bit of background, Richard Larritt has been a professional organ builder and craftsman for nearly 50 years. It's been his life's job (and passion) and if not satisfied with that, he has a very fine 3/16 theatre pipe organ that he installed in his home. (Console pictured left)

Peter Hosking was a Telstra tech officer most of his career. He got hooked on the theatre organ sound at the age of 13 but left it until he was in his forties before taking up studies.

On organ projects, Peter has been Richard's tuning assistant, wireman, electronics sounding board and almost anything else you could think of for 14 years.

Today, Richard and Peter still work together for special

projects and as well as work in the chambers of the Capri Theatre Wurlitzer, both men are players and part of the team performing for the film sessions.

The two men will be in Auckland in September to help our team get the big work started in the organ chambers, and will leave us some homework to undertake, until their return, for a couple of weeks in January and another big push.

Further to the above, WOTA Treasurer John Palmer notes;

As frustrating as the Organ Installation is at times, we are blessed with so many who are making it all possible with generous donations. It recently just got even better!

In March 2019, we applied to ATOS (American Theatre Organ Society) for USD4500 towards the project, and then, heard no more about it. In February 2022, James got a request for an update on the installation as part of the reporting requirements for giving us the Grant. What Grant we replied, we've not received any money nor even had our application acknowledged.

In short, with Ken Double's help (former ATOS CEO) and Dave Calendine (ATOS Treasurer), this has now been rectified and we have received a grant of USD4500, approx. NZD6500 in the Bank!

CLOSING CHORDS

It is with much sadness, that I need to share news of the passing of two of our longest-serving and founding Trustees of WOTA, and very much familiar faces to all of you.

Bill Mitchelhill - 08/06/2022

After almost 95 years on this earth, Bill's final days saw him laid low with Covid, then a fall which led to time in hospital, that saw other viruses take hold and finally pneumonia set in.

Bill had been part of the Hollywood Cinema Wurlitzer organ story from day one! As a member of the Kiwi Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society, Bill and the team travelled to Wellington in 1978 to help load the organ from its storage location into two 20ft containers. They then followed the organ by road back to Auckland, arriving just on midnight, to unload the containers and transfer the thousands of "bits" into the under-stage area at the Hollywood. He was actively involved in helping with the installation of the organ and was immensely thrilled when, in 1982, Australian organist Tony Fenelon brought the console up at the dedication concert, bringing theatre organ entertainment back to Auckland.

Then in 1992, the late Les Stenersen, owner of the organ, announced his desire to sell the Wurlitzer, so a group of key supporters who helped at the concerts, formed the *Wurlitzer Organ Trust of Auckland*, with Bill Mitchelhill being appointed Founding Chairman.

Under Bill's careful leadership, the Trust had the organ improved and enlarged to make it a world-class instrument. The finished product saw theatre organists from all over the world come and have fun playing this amazing organ, entertaining audiences between 300 and 400 at the Hollywood.

But Bill had been a wonderful friend and confidant to me, your scribe, together with his partner Bill Ridge. They were both there for me, getting me through the highs and lows of life.

In 2005, Bill wanted to attend an American Theatre Organ Society Convention and asked if I would accompany him. It happened to be the 50th Annual Convention of the ATOS, held in L.A. and what a musical treat it was. On the way up to the USA, "Young Bill" accompanied "Old Bill" and I to Hawaii for a few days holiday, before Old Bill and I went on to L.A.

While in Hawaii, we visited Pearl Harbour and made that sobering trip out to the *USS Arizona* where thousands of men perished when the ship was sunk during that "day of infamy" in 1941.

Bill's service was held on Monday 13 June 2022, and I was devastated to not be able to attend, as I was fighting a nasty bout of Covid. A small number were on hand to farewell "Old Bill", and former Hollywood Cinema organist, Ron Clark, provided the music for the celebration of Bill's life.

Ron Clark - 26/08/2022

Here I am again, the bearer of more sad news - we lost another of our founding Trustees of the Wurlitzer Organ Trust of Auckland - Ron Clark crossed the Rainbow Bridge following a short spell in hospital, he was aged 82.

Ron became involved with the Hollywood Wurlitzer organ back in the mid-1980s, when we needed a Resident Organist to perform not only concerts, but silent movie shows. This, Ron really excelled in and helped present the Wurlitzer organ to a whole new audience.

He was one of our nine founding Trustees of WOTA in 1993, and with his good business sense, was able to source funding through the ASB Trust, enabling WOTA to pay the final balance owed on the Wurlitzer organ, in 1995.

It was not only his regular appearances at the console, entertaining audiences at the Hollywood Cinema, but Ron's "back-office" skills that were still in hot demand, as we then began to look at a program to help make the organ shine. With his business acumen, Ron helped financially manage the massive ten-year project of turning the Hollywood Wurlitzer from a tired box of whistles, into what was later to be regarded as New Zealand's "showcase" Wurlitzer pipe organ – a cost just short of \$100k! This project earned Ron the affectionate nickname of "The Clark of Works".

With a new-look 3 manual console, and 16 ranks of pipes, giving our organists a much bigger musical pallet of sounds to work with, Ron took the organ to new heights with the silent movie shows becoming increasingly popular.






A little wooden Tibia organ pipe mounted into a trophy to express our appreciation to Ron Clark on his retirement from WOTA – October 2014.


